# [New Funding Opportunities](#)

## **Grants to Support Vulnerable & Disadvantaged People (UK)**

Grants of between £20,000 and £30,000 are available to small, local charities that support vulnerable and disadvantaged people in the UK.

Global's Make Some Noise provides funding for projects that make a difference in people's lives by providing:

- Providing safety and shelter
- Supporting physical and/or mental health
- Developing life skills
- Reducing isolation or improving inclusion

This year the charity is encouraging applications for initiatives that

- Are addressing digital inclusion or providing technology-based solutions
- Projects addressing diversity and equality and projects supporting minoritised communities
- Projects supporting mental health and wellbeing
- Projects working to address poverty and deprivation

The grants can be used for costs such as staff salaries, equipment, technology, refurbishment costs, running costs/overheads, and programme, service or project delivery costs.

Expressions of interest can be made from the 17th May 2021.

## **£300,000 Grants Programme to Support Communities Disproportionately Affected by Covid-19 (UK)**

Grants of between £5,000 and £12,500 are available to UK based Black-led organisations working in communities that have been disproportionately impacted by Covid-19.

The funding is being made available by Do it Now Now's Common Call grants programme and is specifically aimed at supporting charities and social enterprises led by people that identify as Black or Mixed with Black. Priority will be given to organisations led by people with lived experience and that are creating impact in underserved communities and providing services to people that have been adversely affected by the COVID crisis in terms of physical health, mental health and/or financial sustainability.

A total of £300,000 is available and funding can be used to help:

- organisations move to new delivery methods;
- develop new enterprising activities and earned income strategies;
- test the viability of specific propositions;
- and develop clear implementable action plans.

The deadline for applications is 5pm on the 25th June 2021.

## **Funding for Hospices and Palliative Care Organisations (UK)**

Charitable hospices and palliative care organisations in the UK which provide excellent care to patients and their families can apply for grants of between £15,000 and £125,000 towards the cost of capital projects.

The Wolfson Foundation will award funding to new build, refurbishment or equipment projects which should provide increased access to services for new and existing users, improve the quality and range of services, and aim to improve the financial stability of the organisation.

Match funding is required for projects costing more than £50,000.

To be eligible funding organisations must:

- be a registered charity or a statutory authority
- be registered with the relevant regulatory authority, where applicable, and have at least a good rating

There is a 2-stage application process, and the next stage 1 closing date is the 1st July 2021. Applications successful at this stage will have until the 1st September 2021 to complete the stage 2 application.

## **Grants of up to £50,000 Available to Support the Housing Needs of Vulnerable People (UK)**

Grants of up to £50,000 are available to housing related registered charities, co-operatives and projects to support their work in tackling housing issues affecting vulnerable people.

The grants are being made available through the £4 million Nationwide Building Society Community Grant Scheme. The funding can be used to help charities get back on their feet after the impact of Covid 19 and supporting people in housing need, in original or creative ways.

The funding can be used for:

- Core costs – up to 20% of the grant amount requested, including running and facility costs, office equipment, supplies, printing, travel and accommodation.
- Staff and volunteer costs for the project lead partner – including full-time staff, part-time staff, project delivery staff costs and other related expenses.
- Small-scale capital costs – including one-off expenses for equipment, or fixed assets that may have use or benefit beyond the life of the grant (one financial year), such as computer hardware, or items required to deliver a project, such as paint, paintbrushes and gardening equipment.
- Activity costs – such as catering or insurance, costs that help deliver projects or activities but fall outside of capital, staffing and volunteering costs.
- Development and capacity building costs – that support organisational sustainability, such as training staff and volunteers, and external consultancy fees.
- Building works and refurbishment costs – where they're essential to the successful delivery of the project.

The program will fund between 50% to 100% of the total cost of projects which last up to two years.

This year applications will be capped by region, meaning the date on which applications close in each region may be earlier than the final deadline date of midnight on the 17th June 2021.

## **Funding to Enable Disadvantaged Young People Reach their Potential (UK)**

Registered charities (including Schools that are registered as charities for young people with disabilities) that work with disadvantaged children under the age of 25 can apply for funding of up to £10,000 through the Ironmongers Company's grants programme.

Projects must meet all of the following criteria:

- For children and young people under the age of 25 who are disadvantaged
- Consist of educational activities that develop learning, motivation and skills
- Have clear aims and objectives to be met within a planned timescale
- Are within the UK

The Company is particularly interested in enabling primary age children to develop a strong foundation for the future. Projects could, for example:

- support special educational needs,
- address behavioural problems
- promote citizenship, parenting or life skills.

Preference will be given to projects piloting new approaches where the outcomes will be disseminated to a wider audience.

The next deadline for applications is the 31st July 2021.

## **Funding to Support Challenged & Vulnerable Young People (UK)**

Grants of up to £2,500 are available to charitable organisations supporting challenged and vulnerable young people under the age of 16 in the UK.

The 7stars Foundation will provide funding for projects which support young living in areas of deprivation and socioeconomic disadvantage who are challenged by abuse or addiction, who are young carers, or who are homeless. Projects should address a lack of provision and provide immediate support.

Example of support could include recreational trips, mentoring programmes, and counselling sessions.

The next application window will open on the 1st June 2021 until the 31st July 2021 for September funding review.

## **Grants to Improve the Quality of Life for Disadvantaged & Vulnerable People (UK)**

The Hedley Foundation are inviting applications from small-to-mid-size registered charities helping to improve the quality of life of people in the UK, particularly those who are disadvantaged and vulnerable.

The Foundation typically makes around 250 awards of up to £5,000 each year for initiatives that benefit the lives of young people, disabled people, elderly people, the terminally ill and otherwise disadvantaged people and their carers. Occasional larger sums are given to charities where high impact can be achieved.

Applications should be received at least 28 days before the next review meeting on the 28th July 2021.

## **Funding for Charities Working with Older People (UK)**

Grants of between £15,000 and £75,000 are available to charitable organisations which provide care and services for older people, particularly if they have a neurodegenerative condition or are isolated.

The Wolfson Foundation will provide funding for new build, refurbishment or equipment projects which aim to:

- Increase access to services for new and existing users
- Improve the quality and range of services
- Improve the financial stability of the organisation

Match funding is required for projects costing more than £50,000.

There is a 2-stage application process and the next stage 1 closing date is the 1st July 2021. Applications successful at this stage will have until the 1st September 2021 to complete the stage 2 application.

## **Funding for Projects that Tackle the Root Causes of Social Inequity (UK)**

The next closing date for grant application to the Scurrah Wainright Charity is the 14th September 2021.

The Charity supports a wide range of charitable projects with an emphasis on social reform and tackling the root causes of social inequity. The charity favours causes that are outside the mainstream, and unlikely to be funded by other charities. Typically, grants are between £1,000 and £5,000.

### **The charity runs three funding programmes:**

- Yorkshire. Trustees give priority to applicants working in the Yorkshire region. Your organisation needs not be based in the region but the project itself must directly benefit the Yorkshire community. We fund national charitable organisations ONLY if the project is specifically working in the Yorkshire region, with clear evidence of local control and access to the grant.
- Southern Africa, particularly Zimbabwe.
- Projects that have applied to the Andrew Wainwright Reform Trust because they meet the AWRT's broad objectives to work for a just and democratic society and to redress political and social injustices but have not been able to proceed with an application to that Trust because they are eligible for charitable funding.

### **Previous organisations supported include:**

- The Boaz Trust a Christian organisation serving destitute asylum seekers in Greater Manchester which received a grant of £2,000.
- The Grandparents Association in Leeds which received a grant of £4,800.

Organisations applying do not have to be a charity, but its work must satisfy the Charity Commission's definition of charitable purposes and public benefit.

There is a two-stage application process and applicants asked to initially complete and submit the preliminary registration form

## **Funding for Financial Life Skills Projects (UK)**

The MSE Charity has announced that the next round of its grants programme will re-open to applications on the 1st September 2021.

The MSE Charity gives grants to not-for-profit organisations that deliver activities that make a lasting impact on how people think, behave and manage their money.

This round will support projects which aim to improve and deliver personal financial life skills to people in one of the following life transitions:

## **Funding to Build Resilience in Charities & Social Enterprises Serving Black & Ethnic Minority Communities (UK)**

The Ubele Initiative has joined Social Investment Business's £12.5m Enterprise Development Programme as the Black and Minoritised Communities sector partner.

Charities and social enterprises serving black and ethnic minority communities will now be able to apply for grants typically worth up to £30,000 along with support from the Black and Minoritised Communities Enterprise Development Programme which aims to build resilience in organisations and help them to develop their trading plans.

Organisations apply onto the programme and, if accepted, work alongside the relevant sector-lead to outline a package of support that best fits with their specific needs.

Applications can be made between the 1st June 2021 and the 29th June 2021.

## **Boost Choose Now Change Lives Programme Opens for Applications (UK)**

Boost Drinks has launched the Choose Now, Change Lives community grants scheme to help groups benefit their local area.

## School Grants to Promote Physics (UK)

The Institute of Physics has announced that UK schools, colleges or home school groups can apply for grants of up to £600 for small-scale projects or events linked to the teaching or promotion of physics and engineering to pupils aged 5 - 19. Grants can support a wide range of projects such as school-based science weeks, extracurricular activities, science clubs, careers event or a visit from a working physicist or engineer.

Grants may be used for the following purposes: materials/resources; transport; marketing and publicity; other purposes deemed appropriate by the judges; and supply cover (in certain circumstances).

The Institute of Physics is interested in proposals that look at:

- particle physics
- astronomy
- space and nuclear physics
- energy
- transport
- information and communications
- design and promotion
- built environment.

### Previous projects to receive funding include:

- Ampleforth College for a visit to Jodrell Bank Radio Observatory.
- St John's High School for a Practical Rocketry workshop to design a water-propelled rocket.

The closing date for applications is the 1st June 2021 (for projects taking place in the following autumn term).

The BFI Doc Society's Ripple Effect Fund is a new National Lottery funded initiative that aims to help kickstart community based documentary-focused ideas and activities and to reach new audiences

All applicants need to demonstrate how their proposed documentary activity is rooted in their communities and also describe how the activity will address specific needs within these communities.

## **Funding for Songwriters and Producers to Develop their Careers (UK)**

The Performing Rights Society (PRS) for Music Foundation, working with Spotify, has launched a new funding round to develop the careers of songwriters and producers working in popular music genres in the UK.

Launched in 2017 as a response to the long-term career needs of those working behind the scenes, the Hitmaker Fund awards up to eighteen grants of between £5,000 and £10,000 each year.

Applications can be made by songwriters or producers directly (or by their representatives) who have at least five credited works registered with PRS for Music (i.e.: a reputable cut or songs that have national radio plays, streaming plays, or from a reputable writing camp).

The deadline for applications is 6pm on the 2nd June 2021.

## Grants of up to £5,000 Available to Support Women Songwriters and Composers (UK)

Women, trans and non-binary songwriters and composers of all genres and backgrounds have until 6pm on the 114th June 2021 to apply for the next round of the Women Make Music programme.

The programme supports the development of outstanding women songwriters and composers at different stages of their career. It aims to:

- Break down assumptions and stereotypes
- Raise awareness of the gender gap
- Increase the profile of women who are creating new music in the UK
- Encourage women who may otherwise not have applied for PRS for Music Foundation funding.

Grants of up to £5,000 are available to support touring, recording, promotion and marketing, community projects involving high-quality music creators, music creator residencies and live performances featuring new UK music.

## £1 Million Capital Stream of the Homelessness Winter Transformation Fund Opens to Applications (England)

The Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government has launched a new funding stream for the homelessness, faith, community and voluntary sector to provide single room/ self-contained and Covid-19 secure accommodation for people experiencing homelessness in England this winter.

Applicants must be able to spend the capital grant by the 31st October 2021.

The £1 million Capital stream of the Homelessness Winter Transformation Fund will provide grants of between £25,000 and £100,000 to support adaptations and renovations to accommodation, to enable Covid-19 secure environments for winter services.

The fund will be managed by Homeless Link in partnership with Housing Justice.

A pre-application questionnaire must be submitted by the 24th May 2021.

Applicants may then be invited to submit full applications by the 21st June 2021.

## **£10 Million Fund to Improve Rugby League Facilities (England)**

Organisations and clubs that are developing Rugby League activity in their community can apply for funding to improve Rugby League's environments. The funding can be used to invest in facilities and equipment ahead of England hosting the 2021 Rugby League World Cup that create environments that are accessible, welcoming and build a legacy of the 2021 tournament in local communities.

The funding is also available to schools that can open their facilities to the wider community.

The RLWC2021 Capital Grants Programme will invest in projects that offer opportunities for people from all different backgrounds to be active, across the men's, women's and wheelchair Rugby League games.

### **Schools can apply but the facilities will need to be open to the wider community.**

Two levels of funding are available:

- Small scale awards of up to £15,000 and;
- Large-scale awards in excess of £15,000.

The funding is being made through the CreatedBy RLWC2021 Capital Grants programme to promote Rugby League ahead of England hosting the 2021 Rugby League World Cup.

Applications can be submitted at any time up until 23rd October 2021 and decisions will be made approximately every 12 weeks.

### **Previous projects supported include:**

- Bentley ARLFC from Doncaster awarded £14,068.60 towards improving playing experiences by installing new goalposts, purchase of lawnmower, line marker and fencing, and some playing equipment for the development of the game.
- Forge Valley School from Sheffield were awarded £2,091.26 to support School Games Organisers across South Yorkshire with equipment to run and develop Tag Rugby League competitions as part of the county wide approach / offer.
- Swindon St George RL awarded £4,293.74 towards rugby posts for their new ground as well as other essential rugby league playing equipment to assist their mini and junior sections get up and running.

## **Funding Available to Celebrate the Windrush Generation (England)**

Community groups, charities and grass root organisations across the UK can apply for funding to raise awareness of the Windrush Scheme, the Windrush Compensation Scheme or both.

The Home Office is making a total of £500,000 in funding available for phase two of the Windrush Community Fund. The fund is administered by Voice4Change England.

The funding is available to charities, community and grassroots organisations. Several organisations can work together on a project and apply as a consortium. There is no limit on the number of organisations that can be involved in a group bid. The maximum award for each application is £25,000.

Eligible organisations can apply for activities including:

- holding events
- producing and distributing marketing materials
- accessing and using communication channels
- securing support from partners

The closing date for applications is 11.59pm on the 30th June 2021.

## **Funding to Restore Degraded Peatland (England)**

Environmental groups, local authorities, charities, public bodies, individual landowners and organisations can apply for funding to restore peatlands in the uplands and lowlands of England.

Two types of grant are available through the Nature for Climate Peatland Grant Scheme to support different phases of a project:

- Restoration grants will fund landscape scale restoration work on degraded peatlands in England. Applications are invited until the 25th June 2021;
- Discovery Grants which will support applicants to gather the information they will need to apply for a Restoration Grant in future rounds. The first round will open for applications at a date to be confirmed.

The same applicant can apply for both grants in the same year, as long as each application is for different sites.

The scheme is delivered in partnership by Natural England and the Department for Environment, Food & Rural Affairs.

## **Grants for Projects to Help Prevent, or Reduce, the Risk of Heart Disease (Central England)**

The Heart Research UK (HRUK) Healthy Heart grant scheme has re-opened for applications in the Central TV region.

Not for profit groups, voluntary organisations are able to apply for up to £10,000 for projects that actively promote Heart Health and help to prevent, or reduce, the risk of heart disease.

This year, Healthy Hearts UK have adapted the criteria for their Healthy Heart Grants in response to the pandemic. They are now offering funding for projects that can be safely delivered during the pandemic, including:

- Funding for projects that can be delivered remotely or with social distancing measures in place that last up to 12 months. Although projects that last for several months may be preferable, Healthy Heart UK would consider shorter projects, such as one-off events that may last as little as one day or one week (e.g. a socially distanced or online workshop or community event; or a week-long training course).
- Grants for purchases of equipment only, such as exercise equipment, technology, blood pressure monitors, weighing scales etc). This will only be considered if the equipment can be safely used under current social distancing measures and the equipment should be used to promote heart health.

The closing date for applications is 5pm on the 14th June 2021.

## Active Communities Programme Now Open (Yorkshire and the Humber)

## **Grants for Churches for the Conservation of Decorative Features and Monuments (UK)**

The next closing date for applications to the William and Jane Morris Fund is the 31st August 2021.

The Fund accepts applications from churches, chapels and other places of worship built before 1896 for grants of between £500 and £5,000 to carry out small programmes of conservation work to decorative features and monuments. All work funded must be directed by a professional architect or established conservator and completed according to the principles of the Society for the Protection of Ancient Buildings (SPAB).

Eligible work could include (but is not limited to):

- Stained glass windows
- Sculpture
- Furniture
- Internal monuments
- Tombs
- Wall paintings.

Previous awards have been made to:

- St Mary's Church, Cerne Abbas for the conservation of wall paintings (£1,000).

## Co-operative Bank - Customer Donation Fund (UK)
